## £8.45m site 'a good deal for borough education'

Richmond Council spent £8.45m to buy Clifden Road from Richmond Adult Community College (RACC), it was announced this week.

RACC decided to sell the Edwardian school to help finance the development of its Parkshot site in Richmond.

Contracts were exchanged earlier this year but final completion was subject to a number of conditions, including RACC obtaining necessary Funding Agency consent and the college getting approval for additional floor space at its extended site in Parkshot.

The council wants to lease parts of the site to the Diocese of Westminster for the use of a new Catholic secondary school and a new Catholic

As part of the conditions that went with the sale, the college will rent part of the site at a peppercorn rent for two years and to assist RACC's move to Parkshot, the college will rent a part of Old Deer Car Park to help their construction works.

RACC's acting principal Gabe Flint said: "The current economic climate caused us to review our services to ensure that they meet the learning and personal development needs of Richmond borough and surrounding areas.

"The sale of the Clifden Centre, an Edwardian school, has given us the resources to develop our flagship site at Parkshot, Richmond, and create specialist learning environments within an accessible adult learning campus.

"Over the next 18 months, we will be building on our facilities and services we offer

"Our adult mission is central to our vision for the future and although Government is reducing funding to adult education, we want to make sure that fees do not present a barrier to those who need and want to learn."

Adult learning will continue at the Clifden site until the Parkshot site is completed by the summer of 2014. Courses will then move to Parkshot and continue at centres in the community.
